BEAVERCREEK Historical society to meet Oct. 22

The World War II Travelling Footlocker will be the focus of the quarterly meeting of the Beavercreek Historical Society on Oct. 22.

The 7 p.m. meeting, which is free and open to the public, will take place in the fellowship hall of Peace Lutheran Church at 3530 Dayton Xenia Road in Beavercreek.

A presentation regarding the footlocker will be given by Mark Conrad, a retired United States Air Force master sergeant

representing the Miami Valley Military History Museum.

The footlocker’s contents include authentic WWII artifacts that would have been in someone’s footlocker, such as uniforms, insignias, period magazines, ration books and recorded material. No weapons, ammunition or knives are included.

Each footlocker comes loaded with about 15 actual artifacts from WWII, not reproductions.
